Celebrating the Centennial of the 19th Amendment: The Fight for Women's Suffrage

On **February 11, 2020**, we will gather for a luncheon meeting at the Riverside Hotel, starting at 11 a.m.

<u>Dr. Amy Canfield</u>, Professor of History and Gender and Women's Studies at Lewis-Clark State College, will be our guest speaker.

Dr. Canfield, a presenter for the <u>Idaho Humanities Council Speakers Bureau</u>, has a genuine passion and expertise regarding the long journey toward Women's Suffrage.

The Suffrage movement had strong ties to race issues in the United States. Dr. Canfield's talk examines the history of the 19th Amendment within the larger backdrop of civil rights, exploring how race, class, and gender intersected in the fight for women's rights.

Also - in celebration of Susan B. Anthony's February 15th, 1820, 200th birthday, there will be cake!

Voter Registration Update by Chris Stokes



What the Vote! (WTV!) is a voter registration project that started in the Spring of 2018, with three brave souls, Nancy, Chris and Kristine, visiting high school senior government classes in two high schools to inspire young voters to engage in democracy. Little did we know at that time that two years later we would have 114



volunteers on the list who all want to do the same thing: inspire young voters. And little did we know that over the past two years we would have registered 5,084 students in 10 high schools and on three college campuses.

The busy time for WTV! volunteers is in the fall between late August and about mid-October. That is when volunteers 1) make brief presentations in high school government classes and 2) help register

college students on college campuses. Volunteers will be invited to attend a special "Kick Off" event to be held on **Tuesday, September 1, 2019**, at the Riverside Hotel. New volunteers will receive training and experienced volunteers will attend a short meeting to get the latest information. All will form teams to visit the schools and will receive their packet of supplies. A social hour will follow with refreshments and a no-host bar. A "Save the Date" email with additional details will be sent to all volunteers soon.

After the training/meeting and social event, the team leaders and volunteers will begin the robust activity of scheduling visits to the classrooms and scheduling registration tables at the college campuses. This year we will have "Team Coordinators" to help with the organization and implementation for Boise schools, West Ada schools and college campuses at BSU and CWI.

A lot is going on in the background to prepare for the registration activities in the fall. We are working with a Student Advisory Committee comprised of seven high school students who are helping develop the WTV! website that we expect to be ready for viewing by the end of February. This same group will be meeting with a cinematographer to develop a video starring our young students with messages to inspire engagement in democracy. We are also developing a one hour "Skill Building" workshop for the Andrus Center's Young Women and Leadership Conference which will take place on March 10th. At this workshop, we will have an opportunity to continue our message to inspire high school students to use their voices and recognize their power to influence public policy.

It is remarkable how much this project has grown. It could not have happened without the ambitious and capable AAUW and community partner volunteers. Given the experience over the past two years, anything is possible. I look forward to working with each and every one of you again in the fall. On January 8th, the Daytimers met at Artisans For Hope to make an AAUW banner, which can be displayed at AAUW events. The AAUW Daytimers participants were Marsha Bravo, Roberta Olsen, Penelope Smith, Kris Doucette, Donna Looze, Valerie Ward, Kathy Haze, Jane Ludwig, Becky Moore, and Paulette Penney. The members had a range of crafting skills, from novice to expert, but they employed appliqué, drawing on fabric, embroidery, machine sewing, and other hand work.

Artisans for Hope is a Boise-based non-profit organization, serving refugees who have resettled in the Treasure Valley by providing instruction in the textile arts. It sells the artisans' handmade items, providing income for the artisans. It also serves as a social center for the artisans, providing a welcoming space for refugees to create and connect with each other and the community.

We started our afternoon with an activity which was aimed at helping us understand and empathize with what it would be like to become a refugee. We were given nine sticky notes (3 of 3 different colors). On the first three, we were asked to write down three important people in our lives. On the second three, three different meaningful objects and on the last three, three things that makes up our identity. Lastly, we were asked to remove one, two, or three pieces of the papers arbitrarily from each group and then the helpers just removed other pieces of paper each of us had left. This resulted in some having nothing left and others with varying amounts of items. It was a very meaningful activity and touched each of us.

Next, we each designed and made a pennant for the banner, representing values that AAUW encompasses. We worked collaboratively with four refugee artisans: Veronique from the Congo, Shahin from Iran, Seema from Afghanistan, and Ziaa from Afghanistan. Four Artisans for Hope volunteers also assisted: Margaret Morrison, Sue Schiele, Linda Dixon, and Marci Lingo. Thanks to Roberta Olson for organizing this event and to Marci Lingo, the volunteers at Artisans For Hope and wonderful refugees, all of whom helped us have a fun and inspiring event.
