What The Vote! by Chris Stokes



The What The Vote! team is pleased to share a link to the new video intended for high school students this fall: What The Vote! video for classrooms. The video features four wonderful and diverse students who represent the future. We think the video is terrific; however, you might agree that nothing takes the



place of the in-person, inspiring presence of our volunteers in the classrooms. Over the past two years, our efforts resulted in registering over 5,000 students and was what might be considered the "launch pad" for the big election – 2020! And then, along came COVID-19. So, we adapted.

We extend a huge "Thank You!" to Ron Pisaneschi, General Manager, Idaho Public TV, who was recently the guest on the AAUW Boise "A Conversation With..." Ron has once again agreed to publicize WTV! by airing the new instructional video as well as the sixty-second video prior to the election. Idaho Public TV will be able to share this directly with teachers in Idaho in addition to their general audience through on air and social media platforms this Fall.

Please read the following updates to the What The Vote! program for 2020. Also, you will see opportunities for you to *safely* help this Fall.

- Volunteers are reaching out to government teachers in the schools in the
  next few weeks to coordinate the showing of the video to their classes (in
  the classroom or online) Target date is September 22: National Voter
  Registration Day. The uncertainty of schools opening and if there will be
  in-person classes makes this a challenge. The perfect scenario would be
  that government teachers take the time to show the video to their
  students no matter how they are attending classes.
- Volunteers will also be working with the schools to identify one student
  from each high school to serve on our Student Advisory Council. We have
  four students on the council now and we have seven openings. Students
  will be asked to help us with social messaging, registration activities in the
  schools (if possible), and public presentations when needed.
- There is work in progress to organize on-campus activities at Boise State
  University, College of Western Idaho and, possibly, College of Idaho on
  National Voter Registration Day, September 22nd. Volunteers might be
  needed to help with those table registrations which will be outside and will
  observe COVID-19 safety protocols.
- We have gorgeous new What The Vote! banners for the registration activities.
- We are exploring different opportunities for public presentations to promote the inspiring message and voter registration. The hope is that we can make the classroom video available to schools throughout Idaho. We will keep you informed of our opportunities as they become finalized.

Identifying the Grief We Are Living With by Barbara Harrison Condon



This pandemic has brought so much change into our lives; it is sometimes hard to sort out what we are feeling and why we are feeling that way. On top of people losing jobs and, perhaps, housing, there is the loss of personal interaction with people with whom we used to gather. The loss of social engagements like concerts, picnics and parties. The loss of travel to fun places or to be with family. The loss of feeling safe just going out for necessities. For some, it is the loss of personal interaction with almost everyone, because you can bank online and also have your groceries delivered to your door or car. Others are dealing with complicated grief, having lost a loved one to COVID-19 or another disease during this time and not being able to have a 'normal' funeral. Losing that human support or interaction at such a vulnerable time is excruciating. Being diagnosed with a disease during this pandemic also leaves us isolated and vulnerable when our friends cannot gather around us for support like they would in another time.

Identifying the feelings of loss, anger, grief and exhaustion can help us understand what we are feeling and how to deal with those feelings. I have found that it also helps us to be more gentle with ourselves and less critical, especially if we are finding ourselves more short tempered these days.

We often associate 'grief' only with the physical death of a person or pet. In reality, we experience grief with any kind of loss we encounter, whether it seems significant or not. In times like these, it may be helpful to talk with a grief specialist who can help us identify those various losses in our lives that we may

not have thought were substantial enough to make a difference but in reality are.

I am a retired Lutheran (ELCA) pastor with a Certificate in Death and Grief Studies. I continue to take classes in various kinds of grief and loss to enhance my skills as a grief specialist. One of my specialties is in pet loss.

Conversations...The Path Is Crooked by Kathy Scott



So often in the past when we focused on career success (in the corporate world), we thought of a linear progression of moving upwards in an organization, gaining more responsibility and greater rewards. Many of our members were teachers and they were always going back to school to learn new skills that would benefit students and satisfy certification requirements. Many moved into administration. Career paths in the post-World War II era were more predictable.

I remember taking a Career Planning Workshop from Beverly L. Kaye, who is considered a giant in the field of career planning. She had every participant create a five-year goal and a plan on how to meet it. What skills were required that we didn't already have? Who did we need to meet to mentor us towards

that five-year goal? All of this was before technology changed the landscape of career paths and certainly before COVID19 changed the world.

For many, though, career plans have frequently taken unexpected turns for a great many reasons. Perhaps someone worked for years for an advanced degree to open doors in a field of choice; this student succeeded and then didn't like the work or working conditions. Or a totally unexpected opportunity occurred that led to working in a whole new area.

The Path Is Crooked will be a series of Zoom Conversations with women whom we know have zigged and zagged in their careers. Where did they start? What led to the zig and zag? What were the challenges/obstacles? What have they learned along the way?

As we prepare to launch this series, we are asking members to recommend women who have made these kinds of career shifts. We also hope to collaborate with other organizations who share an interest in promoting equity for women and girls.
