May 2021 Program (ZOOM Conversation) by Mary Mosley



On Thursday, May 13th at 6:30 p.m., Josi Christensen will make a presentation on the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA). Josie has done extensive research on the history of the Amendment nationally and in Idaho, so her presentation will be very informative.

As you know, 38 states have now ratified the Amendment, the number needed for it to become a part of the Constitution. However, Congress imposed a seven-year time limit for ratification when they passed it in 1972. When the seven years had nearly expired, proponents asked Congress to extend the deadline for three years, which they did. So, now the question is whether it will go in the Constitution or whether Congress will have to pass it again and 38 states will all have to ratify it again. Josi will summarize the history of the Amendment and bring us up to date on the latest developments.

What The Vote! Gearing Up for Fall by Chris Stokes and Nancy Viano



The What The Vote! (WTV!) team is planning now for the Fall voter registration activities. AAUW members already on our volunteer list should have received phone calls from a team of energetic volunteers reaching out to update our list.



We'll know by the beginning of May the number of volunteers we have who are willing to return to the government high school classes and inspire new voters to register to vote. We'll also know how many volunteers will be willing to help with voter registration on the college campuses. We don't plan to let the pandemic distract us

any longer from our mission which is "Inspiring young voters to engage in democracy."

This most recent legislative session proves that there is a great need for educated voters who will elect smart, qualified leaders for Idaho. WTV! continues to believe the younger voters will bring common sense and reasonable expectations for their futures to the ballot box. We have registered more than 5,000 high school and college students and we're ready to register thousands more.

Even more important is our determination to provide as many tools as possible for new voters to navigate the system and educate themselves. We need an "army" to do that. Most of the activities take place between September and the end of October, before the pre-registration deadline. There are a variety of activities that volunteers can perform, such as:

 Join a team of volunteers and give short presentations in high school government classes where the students are given an opportunity to complete voter registration cards.

- Volunteer to be a "runner" who delivers and picks up supplies for volunteers at various voter registration locations and turns in voter registration cards.
- Assist other volunteers at college campus sites to register voters on campus.
- Help with social media messaging or other tasks required for events, training, and reaching out to other volunteers.
