Homelessness has become an increasing problem in the United States. Why are so many people homeless? What is the demographic makeup of this population? Please join us for dinner on March 11th to learn more about <a href="Corpus Commons">Corpus Commons</a>, the only year-round daytime shelter in Boise, from its Executive Director Jessica Abbott.

The Corpus Christi House (as it was formally known) was founded in 2003, by the Catholic Workers organization as a hospitality day center that offered a comfortable place to sit, rest, read, or visit while providing the basic necessities for maintaining personal dignity. Their mission is to ease the burden of being homeless. They provide a place for people to get out of the weather, take a shower, wash their laundry, pick up mail, use the phone, eat, and be part of a

community. In 2024, the center was renamed <u>Corpus Commons</u> to symbolize that it is a shelter for people of all faiths and backgrounds. At our meeting we will learn what services they provide, who they serve, and the trends and challenges they face.

### STEM News by Deborah Newton



W.IN (Women Innovators) is a group of women in the Boise area who work to introduce young girls to STEM activities and careers. These volunteers "empower girls in Idaho by providing them with the skills and confidence needed to excel in STEaM fields. Through hands-on workshops, mentorship programs, and exposure to real-world career opportunities, W.IN helps these young women develop a strong foundation in STEaM disciplines."

**Lobby Corps Update** by Mary Mosley



January was a quiet month at the legislature, but they have made up for it in February.

<u>Constitutional Convention</u> Representative Redman is calling for a Constitutional convention (HCR 10).

<u>Elections</u> Several bills would make voting harder. Representative Alfieri's bill (<u>HB 139</u>) to require reasons for an absentee ballot died in committee by a tie vote. Senator Lenney's bill (<u>SB 1049</u>) would eliminate affidavits for voting.

<u>Initiatives</u> There are several bills to make initiatives harder to pass or to allow the Governor to veto them. So far, none has passed.

<u>Libraries</u> Representative Cornilles bill (<u>HB 209</u>) would allow mayors to fire library directors. Currently that is the job of the library board.

Representative Pickett's bill (<u>HB 212</u>) would make it harder to get up a petition to close a library district, as was done in Meridian 2 years ago. It would also make it harder to establish a library district, since it is the same process in the law.

<u>License Plates</u> Representative Moyle wants "an appeal to heaven" license plate (<u>HB 235</u>). The House Transportation Committee sent it to the House floor by a unanimous vote. Google it.

<u>Sex Crimes</u> Representative Raybould would make prostitution a felony. <u>HB 88</u> passed the House 50-19 and is now in the Senate Judiciary Committee. Blaine Conzatti of the Idaho Family Policy Center, a Christian nationalist group, wants to make public drag shows illegal (<u>HB 230</u>).

<u>Vouchers HB 93</u> would provide tax money for private schools passed both houses. It does not meet the standards the Governor laid out in his State of the State speech. There is no accountability except for a satisfaction questionnaire parents will fill out each year. Teachers don't have to be certified and background checks are not required for employees. The public has no guarantee that the money will actually be spent on education. By the time you read this, the Governor will have either signed it, vetoed it, or let it become law without his signature. *UPDATE: Governor Little signed HB 93 on February 27 - very disappointing.* 

Women's Health Finally, a bill we can support. Representatives Green, Rubel

and Healey introduced a bill (<u>HB 134</u>) to increase insurance coverage of breast cancer screening for those at high risk. It passed the House 62-6. Here are the 6 who voted against it: Cayler, Harris, Hostetler, Marmon, Rasor, and Wisniewski. It is in the Senate Health and Welfare Committee.

Idaho Family Policy Center, headed by Blaine Conzatti, has introduced bills to require Bible reading and posting the Ten Commandments in schools. Most states do not want to admit that lobbyists write their bills, but Idaho has no such scruples, so they allow Conzatti to act as an unelected legislator and present bills in committee. So far neither of bills seem to be moving.

Senator Shippy wants the death penalty for women who have abortions. Representative Redman wants to make the drugs used in medical abortions controlled substances. Senator Toews proposes to give a tax credit for a fetus, and Senator Adams wants to give our tax money to fake clinics (crisis pregnancy centers), many of which are religious. Senator Nichols wants students to study fetal development (SB 1046) presumably so they will not seek abortions.

Only another month to go. We hope.
